Pastor's Perspective May, 2022

Grace and peace to you! Happy Eastertide, and I hope that you are enjoying spring as it slowly, gradually manifests itself. This is the season of resurrection, hope, and possibility and, despite the bad news that seems to always be with us, the good news of resurrection and new life always will have the final word.

ALLE CE

We had a very good first retreat this past Sunday and began the conversation about what our purpose and mission as a church is in this new time. It was well-attended—both on ZOOM and in person—and there was good, honest reflection about the importance of the church in our lives, especially during these last two years of social isolation and upheaval. We also began addressing the questions of what ways of doing things we have learned that we would like to keep going forward...and what things that we may want to leave behind. What we are doing is reimagining, or revisioning, how to be the church. This is something that all churches have to do to remain open to God working through them and bringing new ideas and new creativity. But it's especially important now as so much has changed both inside and outside of the church.

I just learned through a colleague, Doretta Colburn (pastor of the Waterford UCC church), of a new opportunity offered by the BTS Center called "Fostering Imagination: Building the Resilient Church" in which small churches (and, yes, we are a small church) form groups of 4-5 people to participate in a learning community that would attend the online program twice a month during the upcoming summer months. It seems to fit exactly with what we are hoping to achieve. Here's a description from the BTS Center website:

"Two years into a global pandemic, having lived through a season of tremendous disruption and uncertainty and loss, and facing the urgent crises of our world, many congregations are feeling a collective sense of weariness and disorientation. At nearly every level of society, change is stirring — accelerating change, traumatic change, complex change that requires transformative leadership — and faith communities are trying to find their bearings. In times of dramatic change, small congregations can respond in two

ways: they can become more rigid, holding tight to status quo — a path that often leads to burnout, decline, and death; or they can step into the changing realities with curiosity and faith, adopt practices that nurture resilience, and embrace imaginative possibilities. Both pathways are possible, but choosing the way of imagination requires intentionality, because in times of anxiety, stress, and fear, our imaginative capacity can be diminished and difficult to access. As author, innovator, and environmental activist Rob Hopkins has noted, "We are living in a time of imaginative decline at the very time in history when we need to be at our most imaginative."

Beginning in spring 2022, and continuing through the fall, The BTS Center will convene a Small Church leadership community comprised of teams from small churches in Northern New England — Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, and Massachusetts — with the intention of exploring practices that nurture spiritual and ecological imagination within congregational life. Through shared reading and exploration, twice-monthly Zoom gatherings, participation in The BTS Center's Convocation in early October, and engagement with intentional practices designed to inspire hearts and minds, congregational teams will be guided to stretch their imagination muscles and step into the future with imaginative abundance and deeper resilience."

I am going to apply and would love to have 4-5 others in the church who will join me. If you are feeling called to take part, let me know. The first session is on June 14th. Happy Easter to you and your family and see you soon!

Smile Fund Sale is May 14

The Smile Fund is a denture program for adults in the SAD 44 community. The World Service Committee administers the funds, with an application process. The primary goal is to give people without means to pay for dentures an opportunity to get them, feel better about themselves and be able to work to support themselves. Too many people are afraid to apply for a job as they can't smile. Dentures allows people to eat food, provide better nutrition to improve their physical and mental health. This community-wide program has helped about 96 people since we started.

The sale is Saturday, May 14 in the church dining room from 9 AM to noon. Please drop off any donations prior to Friday, May 13, as a crew is pricing the items then. Help is needed all three days.

Coffee order May 8

Buying coffee and tea from Equal Exchange bypasses the middle man and gives more directly to the local coffee grower. The next coffee order is Sunday, May 8. Just let Jane know what you want to order and she will let you know the amount.

When Equal Exchange started in 1986, they purposely set out to build both a new and more equitable model of international trade and a rare-in-the-U.S. democratic business. They broke many of the conventional rules of the market with the goal to trade fairly with farmers and build democratic supply chains. The concepts of fair



trade and alternative trade were barely known at that time. Today, while they are a much larger organization with more than 100 worker-owners and a significant national and international scale, they are still living the original wild-eyed dream and breaking conventions with every purchase made from their trade partners in coffee, bananas, cocoa, and tea.

Maine Conference Covenant of Care

This Covenant of Care has been adopted by the Maine Conference Board of Directors as useful during any gathering of Conference leadership and is suggested as a model for all the churches of the Conference. The goal of all we do and all people we deal with is WELL BEING.

Our Church Council voted at its meeting on March 3, 2022, to adopt this language to be used at the beginning of all committee meetings and to be printed on all meeting agendas.
