Pastor's Perspective March, 2022



The season of Lent, though a little later this year, is almost here. It begins on March 2nd with Ash Wednesday and culminates in Holy Week and Easter, which is on April 17th. Lent is a good time for going deeper in our faith, for self-reflection and asking ourselves the big questions of our faith: What is it I believe, how does it sustain me, and how am I going to put it into practice? Those are very important questions and are similar to the ones Jesus asked as he journeyed in his ministry toward the cross. This season I am reflecting on some big questions in a Maine School of Ministry class called Spiritual Leadership in a Climate Changed World. The class met once already and will meet three more times through the spring. One of the assigned texts is called Sacred Instructions: Indigenous Wisdom for Living Spirit-Based Change. I

have really enjoyed the perspective of the author, Sherri Mitchell, who was born and raised on the Penobscot Indian Reservation. Alan Ewing-Merriill, executive director of the Bangor Theological Seminary center, presented at the first session and talked about the core issues that will be discussed. The class itself seeks to ask the following questions of faith/spiritual leaders in their places of ministry:

"What knowledge, skills, mindsets and priorities are needed for effective and faithful ministry in a climate changed world?"

"What are the responses you need to have ready for your community?"

Along with those core questions are some other ones. "What direction should we go...in our individual lives and as a church with this overwhelming topic?" "How do we engage people in churches and communities who don't see this as a problem?" "How do I help people to see climate change as a moral issue that requires a moral response?" "How do I help myself and others see how we are all interconnected and connected to the earth and all its creatures?"

As I listened to the first session, I thought about some things I hope to take from the class. Some of them are:

- To learn how to speak about climate change in ways that are helpful and lead to change.
- To learn how to preach about it effectively and in ways that present the issue but don't alienate people.
 - To get at the morality of the issue without veering into politics and an emotional response.
- To encourage people in the church who are interested in a Green Church initiative to figure out the direction and purpose for the church and wider community.

The biggest takeaway from the first class was that it is important to address the root causes of climate change. So much of it is caused by selfishness, greed, apathy, and pride. The path forward will require spiritual solutions, along with scientific ones. Science, as Gus Speth, a Yale scientist writes, can only go so far. Climate change requires a cultural and spiritual transformation.

Lent is a good time to look at what is foundational to us and, if needed, make some changes. God be with you in the work of going deeper, finding spiritual practices that will help you with that, and finding support and nurture from others in the church who are on the same path.

For art, the children are painting using different mediums and exploring their artistic style. Students study the works of varying artists and then use the work to influence their own creativity. Lucy is working predominantly on abstract and modern art. Will is discovering how to incorporate more detail into larger works.

Science is continuing with environmental studies. Students looked at more systems and drew concept maps. They studied animal adaptation and the environment, food webs, ecosystems, animal group behavior and animal & plant life cycles. Jim and Jane took the children to the Gem Museum and focused on the dioramas. The kids have started studying biomes and are creating a diorama.
