Pastor's Perspective April, 2022

Spring is here...thank God! We have been through a long, difficult winter and the seemingly endless COVID time of the last two years. The Russian assault on Ukraine has brought daily bad news and fears about what comes next. There have been deaths of aging parents and/or

grandparents that have brought fresh grief. It's been a tough stretch and we have felt the chill of winter in many ways. Lent puts us in touch with the wilderness and suffering each year as we journey with Jesus towards Jerusalem and the cross. That journey, of course, has an endpoint: the stone rolled away and shouts of "Alleluia! He is risen!"

There is much to anticipate about spring. For me (and I know you've heard this before), there are the joys and anticipation of a new baseball season. For a while it looked like there may not be a season with a work stoppage and lockout. Hope springs eternal for the fans of our favorite teams as, in spring, every team has a legitimate shot (even the Phillies). I'm also looking forward to a trip to the Nashville, Tennessee area in May to visit my parents at their new home and celebrate my father's 90th birthday. Having seen both parents go through major health scares and move to a totally new part of the country, I don't take for granted the opportunity to spend time with them. Finally, I will be celebrating my birthday with Mary and Liam by attending a music festival called Solid Sound featuring my favorite band, Wilco, and many others held at MassMOCA (the UMass modern art complex) in North Adams, MA, from May 27-29. What are some spring events that you are most looking forward to?

Spring is also a time rife with opportunities for us as a church to come together for worship, fellowship, and envisioning the future. Holy Week is a time for us to reflect once again on the events of Jesus' final week and his humility, courage, and sacrifice. It begins on Palm Sunday, April 10th at 10 AM, as we worship waving palms processing together shouting "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!"

On Maundy Thursday, April 14th, we will share in Communion and Tenebrae at 7 PM, reading the account of Jesus' last meal with his followers and the events that follow, extinguishing candles until the sanctuary is completely dark.



On Good Friday, April 15th, there will be a contemplative ZOOM service at 7:00 PM with music, poetry, and readings. Then, on Easter Sunday, April 17th, we will gather on Paradise Hill at 5:45 AM for our sunrise service followed by the Easter service at church at 10 AM.

The following Sunday, April 24th, there will be an all-church retreat on ZOOM from 2-4 PM. This will be a very important time to reflect on who we are as a church and what God is calling us to do in this new time. We have had to re-learn many things the last two years and the post-pandemic landscape is very different from what it was before. At the retreat, we will talk about what things have worked well for us and what we wish to keep as well as what things we have outgrown and what may need to change. It will be a wide-reaching discussion that will include time for worship, small group discussion, and listening to one another. Please plan to attend so that all voices can be heard!

As we traverse through Lent the promise of spring and Easter beckons. God's grace and peace be with you and your family!

Vibrant Worship, Spirited Fellowship, Faithful Service: Small Congregations in the Maine Conference Create New Ways of Being Church.

This is a chance to share heartwarming stories before and during COVID. Presenters are Rev. Susie Craig, previous Associate Conference Minister for the Maine Conference; and Rev. Doug Dunlap, retired UCC minister.

About this workshop: "A common narrative of our time is that churches are dying as membership drops, and church income becomes insufficient to retain full time pastors and to maintain older church facilities. But there is a counter-narrative, that of churches, some quite small, and some following a time of brokenness, who are creating new ways of being church. In vibrant ways they celebrate their faith, care for one another, and reach beyond themselves to minister to the wider wold in out-sized ways. We regard that vibrance as coming not in spite of small size, but rather as a result of congregations taking advantage of their small size." the Rev. Doug Dunlap.
