Christian Education news

It's so nice to see the young children and youth back at church - it makes us all smile! Christian Ed had a wonderful Ice Cream Social after church on the 12th, which was the first day of Sunday School for the Fall season. We had a great turnout of children, youth, and adults.

Our Sunday School curriculum for this year is called "Celebrate Wonder!" It's an engaging



combination of songs, telling of the Bible story, hands on activity, and spiritual practice. Our first month's story is about Joseph and his brothers, from the betrayal (Joseph's brothers selling him to traders in Egypt) all the way through to the forgiveness and reconciliation (when Joseph uses his powerful position in Egypt to help his father and brothers during the famine). Our next month's story will be about Awe - using the story of Moses (from when he's a baby through the exodus from Egypt).

We have a number of youth who have just become middle schoolers this year, and some who are elementary school or preschool aged. The age range of our regular attendees is from preschool through eighth grade. We are using lots of flexibility with our Celebrate Wonder curriculum to teach these different ages and to connect with families who have different levels of comfort around in-person Sunday School during Covid. So far, so good!

We are having a kite flying day after church, on October 3rd. All are welcome. Bring your favorite kite or just come for fellowship, and to watch and enjoy!

Lucy and Will are off to a wonderful start. They have formed a sweet friendship and enjoy skipping rope to rhymes very much. They help each other with studies and from 12-1 p.m. you can hear them giggling in the church yard while they eat their lunch and play.

They have been VERY busy! They have a rhythm to our day and have been blessed with the talents of church friends.

Deb Lewis gave us a fabulous introductory art lesson on Tuesday. We are all looking forward to using our watercolor pencils and Deb's instruction.

Jim Chandler supported our science lessons with a trip to Mill Brook. We are studying the Scientific Method and have learned about bird adaptation and frogs as indicator species. The children conducted an

experiment with Jim's guidance and can determine the pollution of the water based on the findings of the "macroinvertebrates" in the water samples.

Seabury Lyons has started a kite making series. The children can hardly contain their excitement about this! They have started construction and the children are working on their final designs.

They recognized the UN International Day of Peace on September 21 and started the global citizenship studies. Lucy is reading *Stuart Little*. We made felt bunnies and we will be writing our own adventure stories inspired by the reading using our bunnies as our muse. Will is reading *Early European Explorers*. He is particularly interested in the Norse and picked up Norse Mythology books. He will be making a wooden ship model and a magnetic compass.

We studied the North Star as a segue into ocean travel of the explorers. The children wrote some impressive poetry on the North Star. The children have additional math and writing support from Deb Picirillo and French lessons on Thursdays.

We hope to have our kites completed for our Michaelmas celebration on October 3. This is also a family gathering sponsored by the Christian Ed Committee. Next week will be preparing for this celebration with candle decorating, finishing our kites, making wooden swords and dragon bread. The poem for celebrating:
